

- Elementary school teacher for 8 years
- 2019 began at Virginia Tech as the Program Director for the Transfer Experience LLC
- 2022 began working as the Assistant Director of Transfer Students Initiatives, which includes continued oversight of the LLC




- Large, public, state and land-grant institution located in Blacksburg, VA
- Total student enrollment of around 37,000 and undergraduate enrollment of 30,000
 - o 3,031 transfer students
- 1 in 10 VT graduates come to campus as a transfer student

Fall '22



- Living-Learning Program (LLP) is the umbrella term containing both residential colleges and living-learning communities at Virginia Tech
- Residential colleges are led by live-in faculty principals and focus on interdisciplinary, multigenerational connections
- Living-Learning Communities (LLCs) are niche communities built around a particular theme. Each LLC is led by a Program Director.



- LLCs have shown to increase overall satisfaction in college, as well as retention rates and academic performance (Arensdorf & Naylor-Tincknell, 2016).
- The goals within LLCs are to emphasize involvement within the community and encourage students to seek support to ease their transition to a new university. Students in an LLC resulted in greater intellectual orientation, compared to students who did not live in an LLC (Stassen, 2003).
- When students are placed in a community that relates to one another, it is easier to bond. There is a sense of community, especially when there is an effort put forth from student affairs practitioners to show support towards students (Inkelas et al., 2006).

- A spring survey of transfers showed dissatisfaction with campus housing
- VT moved forward with a plan to pilot a transfer student living learning community beginning in Fall 2018

TRANSFER



- A memorandum of understanding between Housing and Residence Life and the Office of Student Success Initiatives within Undergraduate Academic Affairs was created
- An LLC advisory committee of campus partners met monthly



- 69 transfer students lived in the community in two separate Greek life houses
- GA hired as the Program Director, now a full time position
- Weekly curricular and cocurricular events were planned






- In lieu of a student fee, funding was provided by Housing and Residence Life for the LLC's first year
- After its initial year, LLC funding now comes from a \$50/semester student fee

Where Are We Now?





 After moving to various residence halls on campus, Transfer Experience settled into a 275 bed residence hall. The LLC occupies 182 of those beds (3 out of 4 floors).





- RAs were previously assigned to Transfer Experience without any prior connection
- Now, our RAs are selected from previous Transfer Experience members, specifically selected to aid the transfer student journey



- Weekly socials build community within the LLC and expose students to campus resources
- Found success with social rather than academic events





- 1 credit Transfer First Year Experience (FYE) course - UNIV 2114 Unleash Your Hokie Potential
- Optional for all transfer students on campus, but required for new LLC members
- Guest speakers connect students to campus resources
- Former transfer students are hired as class TAs



- Plan, request, market and execute weekly community events
- Teach 1 section of the transfer FYE course
- Review applications for prospective LLC members
- Market the LLC to incoming transfer students
- Run the monthly advisory committee meetings
- Meet monthly with all LLP Program Directors across campus
- Run community social media pages
- Manage community budget



- Students apply and are chosen to be community leaders
- Run many day-of event logistics
- Contribute to community social media
- Generate event ideas
- President, VP, Secretary,
 Campus Coordinator, Social
 Chairs & Members-at-Large



- New initiative for Fall '23
- Creating a Pod Program where returning transfer students will act as mentors for new transfers in the community
- Each new transfer will be assigned a small group (pod) with two returning leaders
