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Reimagining the Bridge: Recruiting and Advising Humanities and Social Science Transfer Students

Partnerships and Collaboration, Transition Programs and Services

The University of Michigan (U-M) and Henry Ford College (HFC) have partnered, with funding from the Mellon Foundation, to build a pathway for HFC students to transfer to U-M and study the humanities and social sciences. Recruitment and advising professionals from both institutions will discuss the planning, collaboration, student-facing intervention, and assessment efforts that have gone into constructing a mutually beneficial bridge program between an open-access community college campus and a highly-selective research university.







TRANSFER BRIDGES TO THE HUMANITIES AT UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Program Agreement

I, ______, have applied to and have been accepted to participate in the Transfer Bridges to the Humanities at University of Michigan (TB2H) program. TB2H is an academic partnership between Henry Ford College and the College of Literature, Science, and the Arts (LSA) at the University of Michigan. As a TB2H student, I commit to earning an Associate's Degree from Henry Ford College while taking advantage of all the resources available to help prepare me to transfer to the University of Michigan for a Bachelor's Degree.

As a member of TB2H, you will enjoy the following opportunities and benefits:

- · Access to events throughout the academic year.
- Opportunities to participate in select U-M high impact co-curricular programs while enrolled at HFC.
- Individual pre-transfer advising to help you plan your course work at Henry Ford College.
- Access to faculty mentors at Henry Ford College and U-M.
- Guidance through the admissions process.
- · Access to designated U-M programs, and in some cases eligibility for funding

By becoming a member of TB2H, I agree to:

- Abide by existing policies and procedures outlined on websites for both institutions.
- Meet once each semester with a dedicated TB2H academic advisor from U-M.
- Attend and participate in all of my classes and utilize resources made available for my success.
- Major in a humanities or humanistic social science field at Henry Ford College and U-M.
- Confer with an HFC advisor to set-up a progress plan towards an Associate's Degree.
- Sharing of my information between Henry Ford College and U-M.

By becoming a member of TB2H, I understand:

- Membership in this program does not guarantee admission to the University of Michigan.
- U-M cannot guarantee that all credits earned at Henry Ford College will transfer to the University of Michigan or count towards degree requirements.
- U-M cannot guarantee that Henry Ford College students will graduate within two years after transferring.
- TB2H is not a scholarship-based program.
- I am eligible to transfer before I complete the required number of credits awarded for an Associate's Degree.

By signing this agreement, I acknowledge that the program expectations have been explained to me. I understand that as a TB2H student I am expected to adhere to all items listed in this Program Agreement. Following the completion of my Associate's degree, I can choose to transfer to another institution besides the University of Michigan.




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Recruitment Takeaways

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• Why: Referrals and efficiency




Takeaways

• Share expertise

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- Manage decentralization
 - Meet regularly
 - Plan for information sharing
 - Anticipate student disorientation
- Find your natural partners



What Challenges Do Our Students Face?



Three Challenges

- Time Commitment
 - Project required backing away from other work
- Decentralized
 - Project Coordinator Role
 - Unclear Project Roles
 - Unclear grant project outcomes "on ground level"
- Logistics
 - Student Lead appointment making
 - Timing of academic calendars
 - Not consistent between colleges
 - Community College offers 15, 12, and 8 week courses
 - Space Use
 - Co-advising

Three Takeaways

- Plan appropriate time
 - Plan project one semester prior to launch
 - Build in blocks of time without students
- Inform all parties
 - All parties should be familiar with grant objectives
 - Communication between departments within schools needs to be frequent and ongoing
- Remember they are students
 - They don't always read
 - Can't assume that they know "things"

Degree Applicable vs Transferable Credit

- Degree applicable
 - 2 year institution degree programs = 60 cr hrs
 - Specific degree requirements must be met (ex. 1st year writing)
- Transferable credit vs degree completion
 - Expense and time
 - Costs for courses that do not transfer
 - Fourth Term Proficiency in 2nd Language other than English
 - UM-A2 requirement

To fulfill the Michigan Transfer Agreement, students must successfully complete at least 30

credits, with at least a 2.0 in each course and at least one credit completed at the institution awarding the MTA. These credits should be met according to the following distribution:

- One course in English Composition
- A second course in English Composition or 1 course in Communications
- One course in Mathematics from one of three pathways: Pathway to Calculus (includes College Algebra), Statistics or Quantitative Reasoning
- Two courses in Social Sciences (from two disciplines)
- Two courses in Humanities and Fine Arts (from two disciplines, excluding studio and performance classes)
- Two courses in Natural Sciences including one with laboratory experience (from two disciplines)



Articulation Agreement vs. Transfer Agreement

- An articulation agreement is a formal agreement (or some would call a partnership) between two or more Colleges or Universities documenting the transfer policies for a specific academic program or degree in general.
- Transfer agreements simplify the complexity of determining what courses to take. They should eliminate the guesswork regarding transferability. They should also save students time and money- an important benefit coping with the escalating cost of higher education alternatives



Key Takeaways:

- At least 30 states have policies requiring a transferable core of lower-division courses and statewide guaranteed transfer of an associate degree.
- Seventeen states have reverse transfer policies set in legislation or board policy. An additional 22 states provide reverse transfer opportunities outside of policy, including through institutional agreements...




2018 is seeing the refinement of multiple statewide transfer policies, pointing to a commitment to increase student completion rates.

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


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
